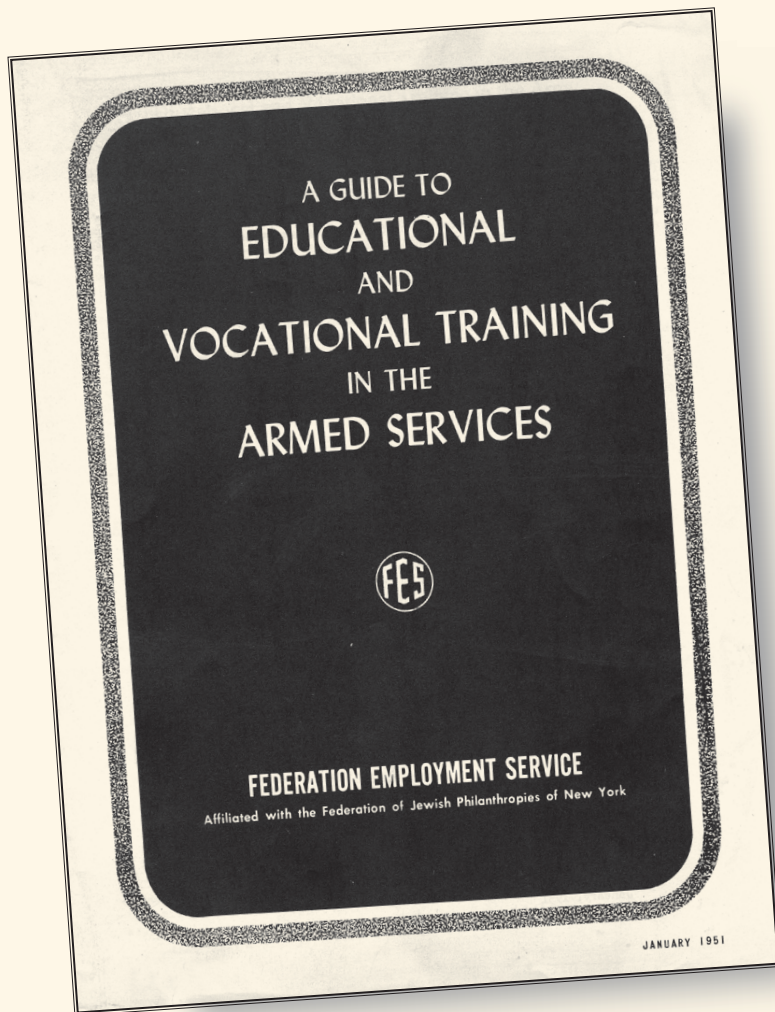
## GUIDING A NEW GENERATION · 1950s

*THE ONLY CONSTANT IS CHANGE. WHEN THE NEEDS OF OUR COMMUNITY CHANGE, F·E·G·S IS THERE TO MEET THOSE NEEDS.*

The early 1950s were dominated by the Korean War. Walter A. Miller, President of Federation Employment Service, wrote, "Because of the international situation, our youth are being called again to the colors. As a peace-loving nation, this task is grim and unpleasant. Many of our young people are sorely perplexed as to how military service will affect their personal career plans. Hundreds of young men have come to us for counseling in recent months."



*Throughout The Korean War, FES counseled thousands of high school students on how the educational opportunities offered by the armed services could help them develop solid careers when they returned to civilian life.*



FES prepared a booklet that, for the first time, created a single, all-embracing current information source about job training prospects in the various branches of the armed services, including: educational and vocational training in the Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, and Coast Guard; opportunities for women in the armed services; and medical service occupations. The booklet was featured in "Guidance News", a 1952 New York City Board of Education publication and reached some 20,000 individuals. ■
